INTRODUCTION

As an ENVIS Centre of the Ministry of Environment and Forests (MoEF), WWF-India compiles a variety of environment-related news and featured items in the print media. This information, which is available for reference in the WWF-India ENVIS Centre, is extensively used by media professionals and researchers and background information on important current and emerging environmental issues.

More than 646 news, articles and media reports on various environmental issues are collected, compiled and represented as “Trends & Analysis Report on “Environment in the Print Media” on the basis of major subjects of concern.

The analysis primarily focuses on the news pieces, some of which rattled nations /states, while others proved to be a welcome change. The analysis focuses on a gamut of environmental issues as well as a plethora of relevant news articles throwing light on questions raised by environmentalists. The basic idea of this piece of work is to bring into picture the role of print media in environmental protection. Growth of economies of various nations, with the help of their respective mechanized industrial sectors unquestionably requiring innumerable amount of resources, proved to be their Achilles heels with respect to developmental growth vis-à-vis environmental concerns.

Since this is an explorative initiative resting on one of the most interesting and at the same time challenging subjects, this analysis be allowed to be provocative, in the sense that it may raise some challenging questions.

Media plays the role of a socializing agent in terms of environmental protection. It is a fact that Public actions and attitudes toward environmental protection are largely shaped and influenced by the media. Media is one of the key channels for creating awareness about environmental conservation and related issues.

The environmental issues have been categorized into 27 (twenty-seven) different subject heads. Each subject is having its own area of coverage. The Quarterly News Analysis for the months July-September is based on the highlighted subjects in the field of environment given below. Importance has been given to subject heads (highlighted below) which comprises of the maximum number of news clippings. The months of July, August and September saw maximum coverage of news in the subject area of Wildlife, Climate Change and Water management. 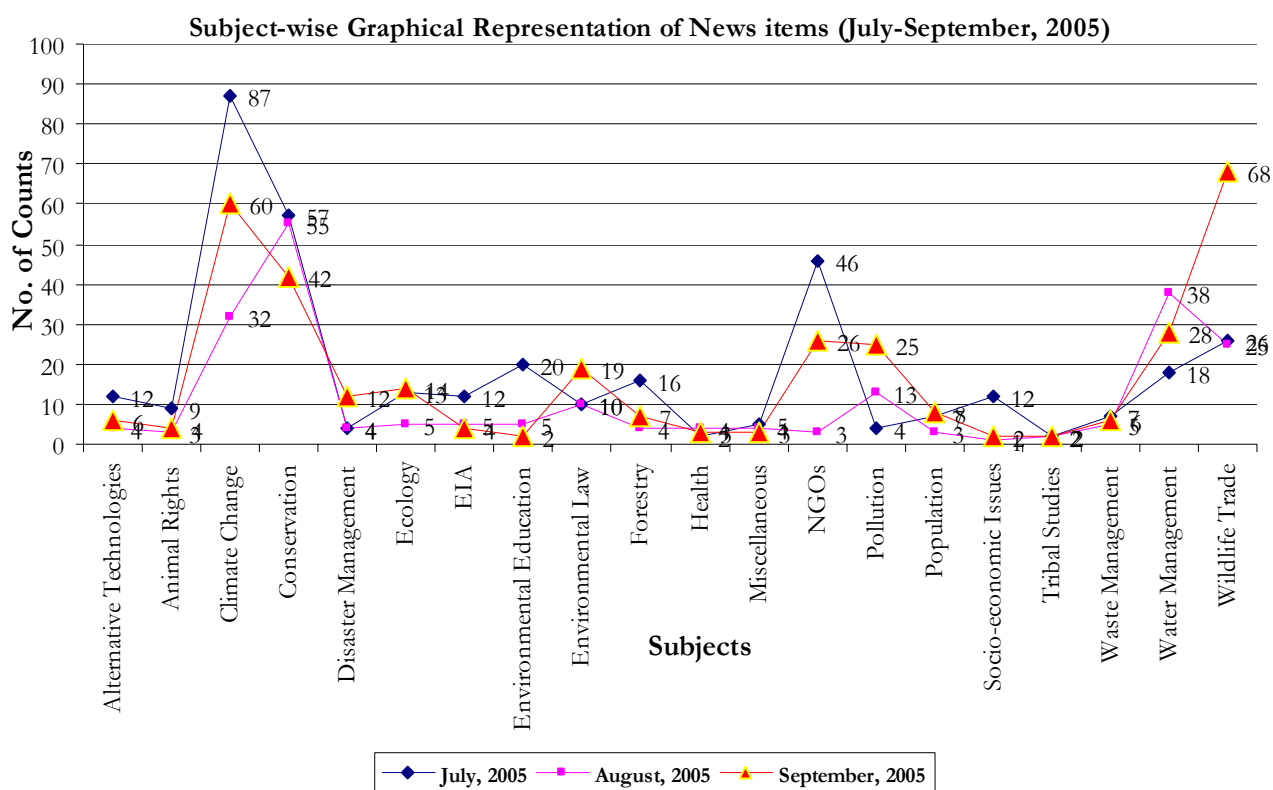

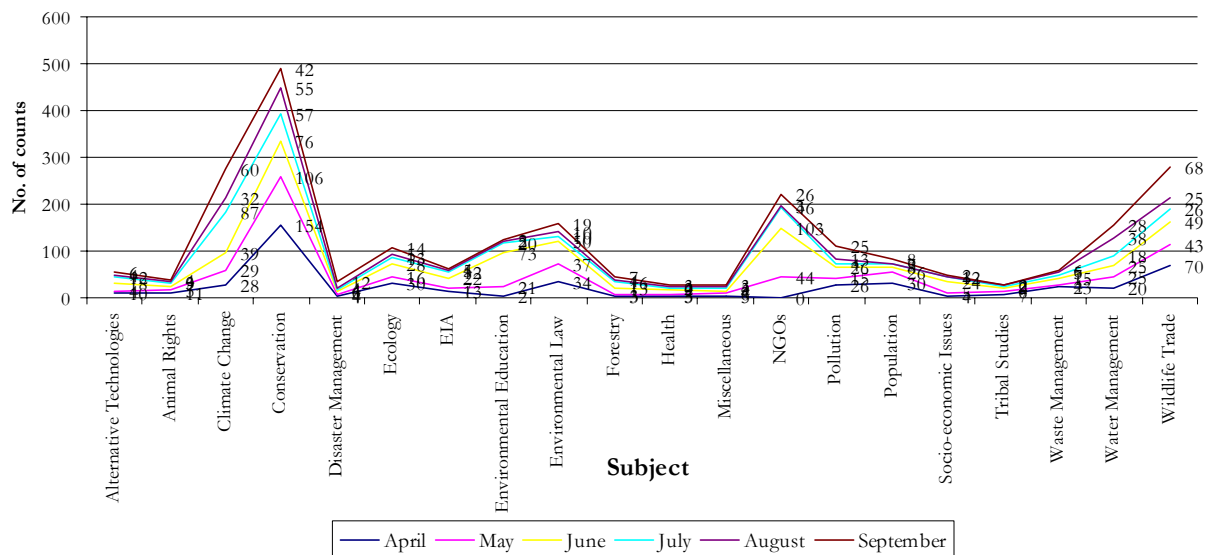

MEDIA ANALYSIS

(July-September2005)

CLIMATE CHANGE

One of the foremost areas of discussion that formed headlines in the newspapers was related to the G-8 summit at Gleneagles. The Prime Minister Manmohan Singh attended the G-8 summit to discuss major issues like alleviating poverty in Africa and tackling the problem of climate change.

The decision by the G-8 to invite the leaders of five emerging economies to join the discussion on climate change recognizes the importance of countries of the size of India and China in matter dealing with the threat of global warming. India believes energy demand management is the responsibility of the world's rich nations and not of the poor, who need greater energy consumption to fuel development. However, during the meet no clear goals were set up, their declaration only made a cursory reference to the binding Kyoto accord which was signed by all G-8 powers except the USA. The G-8 agreed to a wide ranging "action plan" to promote energy efficiency and the use of cleaner fuels.

One of the first key initiative that was taken for dealing with global climate change was Kyoto Protocol in 1997. The 1997 protocol demands cuts in greenhouse emissions by 5.2% below 1990 levels by 2008-12.

Kyoto Protocol was negotiated and signed in accordance with the principles of the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC). Under that agreement all member countries, including developing countries were required to cut greenhouse gas emissions and report to the UN about the progress made. It, however, required the developed countries such as the US to take a

lead in limiting greenhouse emissions. The developed world with only 25% of the world's population contributes 75% of the accumulated greenhouse gas pollution, the US being the single largest polluter. The US which does not accepts the scientific theory about human beings being the major polluter, did not sign the Kyoto Protocol. According to United States, the Kyoto protocol's mandatory targets for reducing emissions by 2012 would be too harsh on their economy.

The US President has said that it is unfair to ask the US to sign the protocol when the world's two foremost emerging economies (India and China) have been exempted from the protocol. Many leaders have been surprised at this comparison.

According to the Union Minister of Environment and Forests A.Raja, the efforts of the developed countries in this regard have been dismal and thus it becomes all the more essential for these countries alone to take up greenhouse gas mitigation measures and demonstrate their commitment towards the global climate. Developed countries should take concrete steps for development, dissemination and deployment of cleaner energy technologies in developing countries.

It was highlighted in the news that the failure of the G-8 meeting to clinch specifics on the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions could have serious consequences for India, which still depends heavily on monsoon for its agricultural growth. Close to 60% of the country's cultivated land is primarily rainfed. According to scientists, rise in the sea levels due to global warming may endanger coastline and dramatically alter monsoon patterns.

Interestingly, in an important turn of events US has roped in India and China to bypass Kyoto Pact. Receiving brickbats from across the world for its refusal to participate in the Kyoto protocol mechanism to cut greenhouse gas emissions, the US has roped in India and China in a partnership that is being touted as an alternate to Kyoto Protocol. Called the Asia-Pacific partnership for clean development and Climate, it will aim to curb greenhouse gas emissions using technology that can reduce emissions rather than setting targets for reducing carbon emissions. Under the new pact, the countries will focus on development of technologies that can cut emissions. The US has been keen on hydrogen as a replacement for fossil fuels. The other technology they have been pushing for is clean coal that gasifies coal before use to remove harmful carbon content. Australia and South Korea which have not ratified Kyoto are also part of the pact. With this announcement, it seems the US will have another excuse to not be part of the Kyoto mechanism. For India, it may be a win-win situation if US is serious about technology transfer to India to reduce carbon emissions. According to US, the new pact will complement and not contradict the Kyoto Protocol. It calls for a cleaner climate and better usage of energy.

There were significant findings in regards to the news related to the impacts of global warming. It was informed by the Union Science and Technology Minister Kapil Sibal that Indian scientists based in Antarctica have found that the mean temperature in Polar region has gone up by 4.5 degrees Celsius in the past 50 years. The rise in water level in the oceans as a consequence of the melting of ice would leave low lying areas submerged.

Scientists monitoring a glacier in Greenland have found it is moving into sea three times faster than a decade ago. Satellite measurements of the Kangerdlugssuaq glacier show that as well as moving more rapidly, the

glacier's boundary is shrinking dramatically probably because of melting brought about by Climate Change. The glacier's movements are considered critical in understanding the rate at which the ice sheet is melting. If the entire Greenland ice sheet were to melt into the ocean it would raise sea levels by up to seven meters (23ft), inundating vast areas of low lying land including London and much eastern Europe.

The news that were prominent in the months of August and September this year included information regarding unprecedented floods in Mumbai; dry spell in June followed by a wet July and again a dry August. Some experts are viewing this as fallout of the change in global climate. This erratic trend in monsoon has also impacted upon the area coverages under different Khariff (summer) crops across the country. It also led to delayed sowing at places. Similar variability in weather pattern is also felt elsewhere. In the US this year, there are regions of drought and wet areas. The recent occurrence of Katrina has brought into fore the issue of global climate change.

One of the significant news in the Clean Development Mechanism (CDM) Sector was regarding the joining of the latest CDM project in the line of 100 projects awaiting validation from the United Nations Framework of Climate Change Convention (UNFCCC), the main certifying agency for companies looking to trade in carbon credits. The Project involves two biomass based power generation projects in Punjab, by Indian Acrylics Ltd. - a Rs 600 crore petrochemical major and India's largest producer of acrylic fiber. The Rs 14 crore projects have a total capacity of 22.5 mega watts and have been developed to reduce the emission levels of greenhouse gases and sell certified emission reductions or CERs (Certified Emission Reductions) to developed countries. The two CDM projects by Indian Acrylics involve rice husk for power generation by replacing oil fired boilers for

process steam and generating power, since rice husk is freely available in Punjab. The two projects have a combined potential to generate 72,300 CERs per annum.

Along with above, SIIL has also become a part of the Indian Companies to join the long list awaiting validation of their CDM projects from UNFCCC. The **Bagepalli biogas programme** has become the fifth Indian Clean Development Mechanism project to receive registration from the UNFCCC. The Bagepalli project activity involved the setting up of 5,500 biogas plants or digestors of 2 cubic meters in capacity at a cost of Rs 20,000 each for single households in Karnataka. This project has been undertaken by WSD (Women for Sustainable development) a trust that is involved in the creation and selling of CERs from CDM projects in rural India. Out of the 19 international projects, only four Indian CDM projects have received the elusive UNFCCC registration thus far.

The news highlighted that each CER stands for one tonne of CO₂ reduction that can be traded globally. The 107 projects approved (host country approval by Union Ministry of Environment and Forests) have “facilitated an investment of Rs 7.816 crore” into the CDM projects. The National Clean Development Mechanism Authority has cleared ten projects recently with the total number of host country approved CDM projects reaching 107. These projects include 62 related to renewable energy, including biomass based cogeneration projects, 28 in energy efficiency, eight in industrial processes, six in fuel switching and 3 in the field of municipal solid wastes. To obtain Certified Emission Reductions (CERs) for projects, companies owning these projects are required to first get a host country approval from the National CDM Authority, Environment Ministry. The projects then have to be validated, registered, monitored and verified at the UNFCCC.

According to a joint India-UK study Global warming will push temperature in the country up by 3-4 degrees Celsius by the turn of the century, hitting agriculture and infrastructure. The report also warned that rising sea levels due to global warming could damage the vast coastal railway network, esp. the 760 km Konkan railway project along the western coast. The study also reported increase in drought, malaria spread as a consequence of climate change.

A climate model developed jointly by Pune based Indian Institute of Tropical Meteorology and UK's Hadley Centre for Climate Prediction and Research predicted that temperature increase by as much as 3 to 4 degrees in parts of Northern India and increase in Rainfall by 10% to 30% will affect rain based agriculture.

The hole in the ozone layer above Antarctica has grown to near record size this year, suggesting 20 years of pollution controls have so far had little effect, the United Nations has warned.

Upto 10,000 people in the Asia-Pacific region could be dying each year as a result of factors assisted with global warming such as severe weather and mosquito borne disease according to a WHO report.

Europe's Great heatwave of 2003, which claimed an estimated 35,000 lives and cost the continent's economies in billions, altogether, may also have fuelled further global warming. A team of more than 30 scientists reports in the journal “nature” that the scorching temperatures and prolonged drought have stifled Europe's forest growth and released huge quantities of CO₂ in the atmosphere, to feed still warmer summer in future.

Finally, a another prominent piece of news was about the Arctic ice shelf that has melted for the fourth straight year to its smallest area in a century, driven by rising temperatures

that appear linked to a building of greenhouse gasses, US scientists said. Scientists at NASA and the National Snow and Ice Data Center, which have monitored the ice via satellites

since 1978, say the total Arctic ice in 2005 will cover the smallest area since they started measuring.

CONSERVATION

A major issue of discussion amongst the government officials and conservationists was related to the clearance given to the Sethu-Samundram Channel Project (SSCP). The project would cut sailing time to east coast and is seen as a major trigger for development of ports in Eastern coast. However, as gigantic dredgers of the Dredging Corporation of India begin to roar into action in the Palk Bay, alarm bells of protest will be raised by a cross section of fishermen and NGOs. People showing great concern for environment are concerned at the haste in getting into the dredging without adequate scientific studies on the possible multifarious impact of an artificial channel in sea floor. The Coastal Action Network (CAN) seeking to quash the March 31 EIA clearance given to the project filed the plea stating that the SSCP was based on a study that was “scientifically incomplete” , and that it was being “pushed by parties having a role in the stability of the ruling coalition” at the centre.

Another important piece of news was regarding the newly enacted Biological Diversity Rules 2004, taken with the Intellectual Property Rights Act. The Act would ensure India’s abundant natural resources were not exploited by other countries without prior permission. India was one of the first few countries to enact a legislation to achieve the objectives of the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD).

Environmentalists are suspecting foul at the State Government’s plan to carry out mining of beach sands in association with a Russian Multinational. The Government plan is to

extract heavy minerals such as titanium from beach sands of the coastal belts stretching from Nellore to Srikakulam but conservationists feel that it will cause severe ecological damage in the long run. It’s feared that it would lead to weakening of the coastline and salination of fresh water.

Another initiative taken up towards the conservation of our natural flora was the Tree Plantation Campaign by WWF-India. To ensure that the sapling that has been planted does not die for want of care and attention and to make the planters more responsible, WWF-India had initiated a programme called “Adopt a Plant”. As a part of a sustainable drive, WWF-India organized this mass campaign towards creating more green lungs in Delhi and NCR region.

In the same context, WWF also plans to launch a program to protect depleting rainforests on the Borneo Island. This project aims to assist Malaysia, Indonesia and Brunei in conserving 220,00 sq km of rainforest through a network of protected areas and sustainably managed forests.

The six Asian countries sharing the Lancang-Mekong River have agreed to build biodiversity conservation corridors in its basin-the first in the continent. The initiative taken by Cambodia, Myanmar, China, Thailand and Vietnam could be a blessing for wildlife in the fragmented Greatest Mekong Sub-Region (GMS). Habitat fragmentation mainly caused by rapid economic development possesses a growing threat to the rich animal and plant diversity in GMS.

One of the significant news in wildlife conservation was related to the conservation of Gangetic dolphins. The numbers of Gangetic dolphins have declined drastically in last century due to excessive intrusion by man into their habitat. Listed by International Union for Conservation (IUCN) as “Endangered” and placed in the schedule-I of the Indian Wildlife Protection Act, 1972, the Dolphins enjoys high levels of “legal protection”. Yet its population is facing threat. This is due to the absence of a coordinated conservation planning, lack of awareness, continuing developmental pressures and almost no protected areas for the species. Concerned with the growing apathy towards dolphins, the WWF-India intervened and initiated Ganges River Dolphin Conservation Program in 1997.

Similarly for the marine counterpart, a new Dolphin Sanctuary in Chilka Lake, the largest brackish water lagoon in the country, has been mooted to conserve and preserve the rare marine species. This initiative was taken after the Orissa Government took notice of the death of 38 Irrawady dolphins in Chilka Lake in the past 3 years. The proposed sanctuary spread over 30 sq km located along the east coast has been identified as a significant hotspot of biodiversity in the region harboring the largest number of Irrawady Dolphins. The main identified threats to the dolphins are from the operation of a variety of fishing nets and gears from mechanical boats.

The month of August and September was flooded with the news of recommendations made by the Tiger Task Force on Tiger Conservation in the country. The report “Joining the Dots” prepared by the task force closely follows its terms of reference. For instance, it has suggested a new method of estimating tiger status which will be tested when the tiger census begins in November 2005.

The terms include “measures to strengthen tiger conservation in the country”. In this respect, it suggests institutional reforms, such as improving Centre-State collaboration among institutions that protect the tiger. Protection, it says, cannot be done by injecting more guns, more guards and more money into reserves. Sariska spent more on its tigers than all other reserves, yet the tigers disappeared. So the report suggests each reserve spruce up its management plan, a plan that takes the local context of protection into account. In addition, the report wants a fierce crackdown on wildlife crimes. The current enforcement mechanism is extremely weak; the report, therefore, suggest the criminal provisions of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 be amended as deterrent to protection.

The report amplifies its argument using detailed research on a hitherto bedeviling aspect of conservation: the relocation of people from tiger reserves. The report finds that in the last 30 years, only 80 villages have been relocated. Today, there are 273 villages inside the core areas of reserves and another 1,214 in the buffer. In short, it concludes, whereas conservationists have always argued for relocation, the fact remain its both a logistical and financial problem. Conservation can thus be “inclusive”. If people, forests and tigers are to co-exist, then certain steps must be taken. First, villages located in habitats crucial to the tigers (natal areas) must be relocated, but only after a plan is made that has their approval. Second, the productivity of forests and pasturelands in reserve fringes must be increased. Third, through measures such as homestead tourism, or involving people in forest protection (in return for which service they must be paid), local communities can actively help protect the tiger.

Similarly as an important initiative for the protection of wild bears, the Wildlife Trust of India (WTI) is all set to initiate a major conservation drive in the North-East

following the arrival of an infant bear cub from Assam to the Centre for Bear Rehabilitation and care (CBRC) in Arunachal Pradesh. Asiatic black bears in Arunachal Pradesh are under threat due to the gradual decline of forest cover, increasing human population, shrinking food base due to the decline of fruiting trees and encroachments into their habitats.

The news regarding poor conservation of natural habitat in Jammu and Kashmir was also significant. The Centre Ministry of Environment and Forests and Wildlife enunciated several policy instruments and introduced various action programmes to resolve the growing problems of environment as well as to consider several cross sectoral issues having a direct bearing on conservation and sustainable use of natural resources including forestry and wildlife, but the entire

exercise has proved futile in J & K. The main reason is the diversion of funds meant for the purpose to other sectors, mismanagement in utilization of left over funds, non seriousness of state government towards environment related issues and the half hearted approach of the agencies concerned towards conservation projects.

Another significant piece of news was related to the decision of Assam government in collaboration with WWF-India and International Rhino Foundation (IRF) to translocate rhinos from their existing homes at Kaziranga and Pobitora National Park to five other erstwhile rhino territories – Manas, Orang, Burahchapori, Laokhowa and Dibrusaikhowa in the state. The Project – India Rhino Vision 2020 – seeks to achieve a rhino population of 3000 by 2020.

WATER MANAGEMENT

Water scarcity has become a serious problem. Much of the water supplied to the urban areas is sourced from underground wells or river systems. These run almost completely dry in summer. Inter state tussles over supplying water further exacerbate the problem. Even in the capital city of Delhi, poor distribution and loss of water through leakage from tanks and pipelines reduce the quantity that reaches the consumer by 10-15% or even more. Delhi depends on neighboring states of UP and Haryana for water for its treatment plants. But against its demand of 900 million gallons per day, the capital gets less than 700 million gallons. So is the case in other major cities.

An important piece of news highlighted Tamil Nadu chief minister J.Jayalithaa's vigorous campaign on taking up the project of interlinking of rivers. She has insisted on a three fold approach to meet the growing situation of water scarcity. One she has been

insisting on de-salination of sea water. Secondly the recycling of waste water and thirdly the interlinking of rivers.

It was quoted in one of the newspapers that panel to monitor rain water harvesting is missing in Delhi Jal Board's agenda to promote and create awareness about rain water harvesting. Though the board has done a tremendous job in terms of installation and running of rain water harvesting structures, it doesn't have a clue on the exact amount of rain water being harvested by it or its impact on groundwater. Monitoring is must to ensure that the groundwater is not polluted, there is no contamination in catchment areas and the chamber where water is harvested is cleaned and its filters changed regularly.

A significant event that was highlighted in the news of August-September was related to the signing of a memorandum of understanding

between Mulayam Singh Yadav and Babulal Gaur in the presence of Prime Minister in regard to the linking of Ken and Betwa Rivers in Uttar Pradesh and Madhya Pradesh respectively. The Interlinking of Rivers (ILR) program has received a major boost as a result of this agreement. The Rs 4263 crore project will bring irrigation to various districts in UP and MP. The ambitious project will also produce hydel power. The project envisages diversion of surplus water in the Ken river basin to the water deficit Betwa basin through the construction of a dam on Ken River and a 231Km link canal. However, environmentalists fear that the linking of rivers would drown large areas while making some other areas thirst for water. At the same time it would destroy the environment of large stretches. The debate on this topic continues even now.

The ambitious rainwater harvesting scheme, Suvarna Jala is all set to be launched in 23,683 government primary schools across the state of Karnataka on October 2, 2005. The scheme assumes importance as nearly 21,000 rural habitats out of 56,682 in the state lack safe drinking water. And water is being supplied in tankers to 196 habitats and through borewells in 91 habitats. Suvarna Jala scheme helps recharge ground water and will ease the drinking water problems.

A major initiative in rain water harvesting which was in news in the last three months was about the Rainwater Harvesting project being taken up by the authorities in Greater Kailash IV, New Delhi to meet the pressing needs of the residents. The project was funded by the contribution of all the residents and was also supported by Coca-Cola.

On similar lines, The Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC) has also undertaken

rainwater harvesting at most of its stations on the Indraprastha-Dwarka subcity line as an environmental protection measures. The DMRC has included rainwater harvesting as part of its station construction contract and is considering the same for Phase II of the project as well. This initiative of DMRC will help in recharging the groundwater as it has established large catchment areas at the stations wherein storage tanks have been built to collect rainwater. Delhi seems to be working hard on water management issue with Delhi University colleges having taken up rainwater harvesting project in a big way. The project will help raise the level of ground water in the capital and also be a sustainable source of water for Delhi in the long run.

One of the major issues that had come up in the just concluded 36th meeting of the Joint Rivers Commission (JRC) held in Dhaka in September was related to Bangladesh's apprehension on interlinking of rivers programme. India has informed Bangladesh that the United Progressive Alliance Government proposes to take up peninsular links under the interlinking of rivers programme. There is no proposal to take up any Himalayan link.

Karnataka government is stretching itself to the maximum in popularizing the concept of rainwater harvesting in rural habitations across the state. The government passed an order on property tax for 5 years to rural folks whose houses have rainwater harvesting facilities. The introductory offer involves discount of 20% on the property tax that you pay. Encouraging rainwater harvesting facilities will not only check depletion of the groundwater table but also tackle flourosis which is a water borne disease.

WILDLIFE TRADE

In the last three months, majority of the news featured decline in elephant and tiger population across the country. In one of the major discoveries, study has predicted that more male Asian elephants in China will be born without tusks because poaching of tusked elephants is reducing the gene pool. The tusk-free gene, which is found between 2 and 5 per cent of the male Asian elephants, has increased to between 5 and 10 per cent in elephants in China, according to Zhang Li, an associate professor at Beijing Normal University. This decrease in the number of elephants born with tusks show the poaching pressure for ivory on the animal. Another alarming piece of news was related to the indiscriminate poaching of one horned Rhino in Nepal. The future of Nepal's one-horned Rhinos is under threat, with ten of the endangered animals being killed in a National Park over the past three months. Poachers gunned down the animals in the Royal Chitwan National Park in south-central Nepal. The figure, reported by the Kathmandu Post daily quoting an official of the Department of National Parks and Wildlife Conservation, comes as a further blow to Nepal's successful story in breeding the rare animal.

Alongside conservation of tiger was one of the major issues of discussion that was highlighted in most of the newspapers. Ms Sunita Narain, Chairperson of the Tiger Task Force, whose report recommending peaceful coexistence of man and animal near Tiger reserves has drawn sharp criticism from wildlife conservationists, defended the stand taken by the task force on the issue. Pointing out that tigers had disappeared in Sariska mainly because people living in the fringes of the reserve had become bitter and antagonistic towards the big cat, she argued that effort had to be made to protect tiger reserves while protecting the rights and interests of the people living around them.

The Union government constituted the Task Force in April after the Sariska incident in Rajasthan made the government wake up to the reality that the big cats were fast vanishing from the Indian forests. Ms Narain said if the government is serious about relocating villagers from their present habitat near tiger reserve, than it should start looking at serious solution as in the last 30 years, the government had rehabilitated only 80 odd villages from the 28 reserves. The tiger task force has recommended that instead of previous approach that stresses on more guns and guards as the response to the tiger conservation crisis, a new programme should be formulated under which the local communities should be given a share in tourism earnings and a role in collaborative management.

Another set of dramatic findings released from investigations in China and the Tibet Autonomous Region (TAR) reveal the previously unknown scale of the trade in tiger and leopard skins. The Environmental Investigation Agency (EIA), who first pioneered undercover investigation into crimes against wildlife and the environment 21 years ago, and the Wildlife Protection Society of India (WPSI) have obtained footage revealing the staggering size of the market for tiger and leopard skins- much of which is being used for costumes and ceremonial events. The quantity and blatant display of tiger and leopard skins in TAR and China demonstrates a lack of awareness among consumers about the plight of the tiger, and the urgent need for targeted enforcement to stop traders from smuggling and illegally selling the skins of tigers and leopards.

News regarding Prime Minister's drive to begin the red tape choking the vulture was significant. Safety tests have started on one

alternative to a veterinary drug (Diclofenac) considered by many to be so lethal to vultures that it has brought them close to extinction. Simultaneously, moves are on to phase out the lethal drug. Since last year, the environment ministry has been trying to convince the health and animal husbandry departments to phase out vet diclofenac. They argue that vultures were exposed to the drug when they fed on carcasses of livestock treated with diclofenac, leading to kidney failure and death.

Unfortunately another daunting piece of news was regarding the sale of wild animals on Internet. Gorillas, tiger and chimps can all be bought for as little as a few hundred pounds, despite international bans on their sale. The illegal online trade in rare and exotic wildlife is now worth billion of pounds and sales are soaring, according to a new report by the International Fund for Animal Welfare (IFAW).

SUMMARY

The months of July, August and September witnessed many significant issues being highlighted in a variety of newspapers. The prominent ones included recommendations made by the Tiger Task Force on Tiger Conservation in the country, conservation of Gangetic dolphins, the Interlinking of Rivers (ILR) program, global negotiations on tackling climate change etc. The G-8 agreed to a wide ranging “action plan” to promote energy efficiency and the use of cleaner fuels during the meet at Gleneagles. It was widely accepted that Developed countries should take concrete steps for development, dissemination and deployment of cleaner energy technologies in developing countries. A significant event that was highlighted in the news of August-September was related to the signing of a memorandum of understanding between Mulayam Singh Yadav and Babulal Gaur in regard to the linking of Ken and Betwa Rivers in Uttar Pradesh and Madhya Pradesh respectively. One of the dreadful pieces of news reflected the scale of the trade in tiger and leopard skins in Tibet and China. The quantity and blatant display of tiger and leopard skins in TAR (Tibet Autonomous Region) and China demonstrates a lack of awareness among consumers about the plight of the tiger, and the urgent need for targeted

enforcement to stop traders from smuggling and illegally selling the skins of tigers and leopards.

The news of previous months also signified issues in similar lines. The news related to conservation, large scale poaching in Sariska, formation of Tiger Task Force, impacts of climate change was among the prominent ones. The last three months have carried forward the measures being undertaken for dealing with the problems faced in the beginning of the year in Environmental Protection.
